Recommendations:

That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a new Premises Licence and make determinations in respect of this application, namely to:

- i) grant the application as submitted, subject to any Mandatory Conditions required;
- ii) modify the conditions of the licence;
- iii) exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
- iv) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor:
- v) reject the application,

and for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added.

The decision must be in line with the licensing objectives contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

1. Executive summary

- 1.1 The purpose of the Licensing Sub-Committee meeting is to determine an application for a new Premises Licence at Lounge, 6 The Plains, Totnes, TQ9 5DR in accordance with Section 18 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The Licensing Department have received five representations in objection to the application and one representation in support of the application. The application will therefore need to be determined by the Licensing Sub-Committee.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Licensing Authority received an application from Loungers UK Limited for a new premises licence on 23rd February 2024. The application is for:
 - Late Night Refreshment (indoors and outdoors): Monday to Sunday from 23:00 to 00:30.
 - Supply of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises: Monday to Sunday from 10:00 to 00:00.
 - Opening Hours: Monday to Sunday 08:00 to 00:30.
 - Non-standard timings: The premises may remain open for the sale of alcohol and provision of late night refreshment from the terminal hour for those activities on New Year's Eve through to the commencement time for those activities on New Year's Day.

A copy of the application form and plan is attached at **Appendix A.**

- 2.2 The premises is situated on The Plains in Totnes which is within the town centre, close to other businesses and to residential properties. The location of the premises can be seen at **Appendix B.** The sale of alcohol will take place inside the building, with alcohol being consumed in a designated area inside and outside (as marked on the plan at **Appendix A**).
- 2.3 The premises was previously run as an organic food shop and café. It was licensed to sell alcohol for consumption on and off the premises daily from 08:30 to 21:30.
- 2.4 During the consultation period, five relevant representations were received in objection to the application from local residents and Environmental Health. There is also one representation in support of the application. These are attached at **Appendix C**.

Representations

2.5 Issues raised in the representations predominantly relate to the Prevention of Public Nuisance licensing objective. The main concerns being the potential for noise disturbance from music and from customers, particularly late at night. Another issue raised is

- the fear that the operation of the premises could lead to anti-social behaviour, which is relevant to the Prevention of Crime and Disorder licensing objective.
- 2.6 The representation received from Environmental Health highlights the concerns they have about noise from customers using the outside seating area, as well as noise from handling of items such as beer kegs and bottles and noise from plant equipment. They have requested a Noise Management Plan and that additional conditions are put in place to manage noise from the premises and patrons.
- 2.7 Any information contained in the representations which is not relevant to the promotion of the four licensing objectives (see 2.10) cannot be taken into consideration when determining the premises licence application.

The Live Music Act 2012

2.8 The Live Music Act 2012 and subsequent amendments, allow the provision of live and recorded amplified music at any premises licensed for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises between the hours of 08:00 and 23:00. There is no way to restrict these activities through the premises licence during these hours, other than through the review process once a licence has been granted. Music played in the background (at a level where a conversation can be easily held) is never licensable. Should a licence be granted to include the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises, live and recorded amplified music will automatically be permitted until 23:00 on any day, or until the end of alcohol sales (whichever is earlier).

Policy and Statutory Guidance

- 2.9 Section 3.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.
- 2.10 The four licensing objectives are:
 - The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - The prevention of public nuisance
 - The protection of children from harm
- 2.11 Section 3.2 of the Policy states: These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be appropriate to achieve the licensing objectives. Each objective is of equal importance. A licence will only be granted where the Licensing Authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.

- 2.12 Section 2.4 of the Policy sets out additional legislation, strategies, policies and guidance to which the Licensing Authority will have regard.
- 2.13 The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 which was revised and re-published in August 2023 state: The Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives (paragraph 10.8 of the guidance).
- 2.14 The following responsible authorities are statutory consultees under the Licensing Act 2003:
 - Devon and Cornwall Police
 - Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service
 - Devon Safeguarding Children's Board
 - Devon County Council Trading Standards
 - Devon Drug and Alcohol Action Team, NHS Devon
 - South Hams District Council Planning Department
 - South Hams District Council Environmental Health (Health & Safety)
 - South Hams District Council Environmental Health (Pollution Control)
- 2.15 No representations have been received from responsible authorities.
- 2.16 In addition to the above responsible authorities, any person may make a representation in relation to a premises licence application.

3. Outcomes/outputs

- When determining an application for a premises licence, particularly when considering appropriate conditions and operating hours, the following sections of the Statement of Licensing Policy (the policy) and Section 182 Guidance (the guidance) are especially relevant:
- 3.2 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave (paragraph 2.24 of the guidance).

- 3.3 Sections 5.5.1 and 5.5.2 of the policy states: The Licensing Authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application, but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are relevant objections to those hours raised on the basis of the licensing objectives.
- 3.4 However, when issuing a licence with hours beyond midnight it is more likely that relevant representations will be made unless there are higher standards of control within operating schedules in order to promote the licensing objectives, especially for premises which are situated near residential areas or in areas where anti-social disorder takes place.
- 3.5 Section 5.5.5 of the policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the Applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the Licensing Authority believe it appropriate to restrict the hours required due to the nature of the activities and the amenity of the area. If the Licensing Committee or a sub-committee believes that granting longer hours would undermine the licensing objectives, it may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested.
- 3.6 Section 3.8.1 of the Policy states: The Authority recognises the great variety of premises for which licences may be sought. These include theatres, members' clubs, sports clubs, cinemas, restaurants, pubs, nightclubs, cafes, takeaways, community halls, schools and off-licences. The Authority will not restrict access by children to any particular type of premises unless it is considered appropriate to do so in order to protect them from harm.
- 3.7 Section 3.8.6 of the Policy states: When deciding whether or not to limit access to children the Licensing Authority will judge each application on its own individual merits. Examples which may give rise to concern in respect of children would include premises: -
 - □ where entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is provided
 - □ where there is a strong element of gambling taking place
 - □ with a known association with drug taking or dealing
 - where there have been convictions of the current management for serving alcohol to those under 18 years
 - where the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is exclusive or primary purpose of the services provided at the premises
 - where there are unsupervised areas (for example toilets, beer gardens, play zones).
- 3.8 At paragraph 2.15 of the guidance it states:
 Licence holders should make provision to ensure that premises
 users safely leave their premises. Measures that may assist include:

- Providing information on the premises of local taxi companies who can provide safe transportation home.
- Ensuring adequate lighting outside the premises, particularly on paths leading to and from the premises and in car parks.
- 3.9 The desired outcome is a determination of the application with reasons provided which relate to the four licensing objectives and when conditions are imposed, that these are appropriate to address the licensing objectives.

4. Options available and consideration of risk

- 4.1 The Licensing Authority may decide to impose additional conditions to address the four licensing objectives, or to amend or remove requested licensable activities. When coming to their decision the Licensing Sub-Committee must give consideration to the Section 182 Guidance and the Statement of Licensing Policy. Reasons must be given which relate to the licensing objectives for any decision made.
- 4.2 The Sub-Committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential properties, the history of the management of the premises (if applicable), the evidence provided of any problems in the past, the likely impact of any extension of hours and activities, public transport, taxi availability, the right the applicant has to operate a business and balancing the rights of residents to the guiet enjoyment and privacy of family life. The South Hams relies on tourism, with the population in the district doubling in the summer months with holidaymakers both from this country and international visitors who are, in the main, families with young children and retired people – the very segment of society who would perhaps be deterred by anti-social behaviour. These, and any other relevant issues, may be explored at the hearing in so far as it reflects the four licensing objectives.
- 4.3 A decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee may be appealed by the applicant or any person who has made relevant representations. The right of appeal is to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003. The Magistrates' Court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the Licensing Authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The Magistrates' Court may make any costs order it thinks fit.
- 4.4 The Licensing Act 2003 contains a provision which enables a responsible authority or any other person to apply to this Licensing Authority for a review of the premises licence once granted. A hearing follows which enables the Sub-Committee to use the

normal powers available, but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to withdraw it.

5. Proposed Way Forward

- 5.1 That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a new Premises Licence and make a determination in respect of this application, namely to:
 - i) grant the application as submitted, subject to any Mandatory Conditions required;
 - ii) modify the conditions of the licence;
 - iii) exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - iv) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
 - v) reject the application, in line with the licensing objectives (Section 4) contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

Similarly, if
		the application is rejected, the Sub-Committee must give its reasons. The applicant or any person who has made relevant representations has the right to appeal a decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of Licensing Act 2003. On appeal, the Magistrates' Court may:
- Cinanaial	N	 a) dismiss the appeal; b) substitute for the decision appeal against another decision which could have been made by the Licensing authority; c) remit the case to the Licensing Authority to dispose of it in accordance with the direction of the court.

All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
- 2. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.



Thank you for consulting Environmental Health on the premises licence application for 6 The Plains Totnes.

We would like to make a representation on the basis that the information in the application form and operating schedule is insufficient in order for us to determine if the applicant is promoting the licensing objective of prevention of public nuisance:

- 1. Noise from patrons using external areas
- a. How does the licensee plan to manage noise in the street from patrons, especially later in the evenings?
- b. What does "rendered unusable" mean? Ideally, tables and chair should be removed from the street as it is a public highway, not part of the premises. There is also the potential for them to attract late night pub-goers, displaced persons, youths, etc, and/or give rise to ASB.
- c. Is it intended that the rear exit, into the shopping arcade, also be used to allow smokers in and out? How would this be managed?
- d. What are the plans for dispersal of patrons after closing time?
- 2. Other noise from premises
- a. What are the arrangements for the handling of beer kegs, bottles and other similar items?
- 3. We understand that the applicant has applied for late night refreshment both indoors and outdoors, however the application form also states that tables and chairs will be rendered unusable after 23:00 hrs. Could the applicant please clarify?

In respect of noise from the premises, EH would recommend that Loungers submit a Noise Management Plan and suggest additional conditions to manage noise from the premises and patrons.

4. Licensable Activity: Late Night Refreshment 23:00 hrs – 00:30 hrs. Concern re noise from plant equipment (including heat exchangers, condensers, ventilation units, air-con, chiller units etc).

EH are concerned about the potential for noise nuisance related to the use of plant equipment after 23:00 hrs. After a serious noise nuisance occurred at the premises last year, EH have requested that no ventilation related equipment/heat exchange units/condensers/air-con units, etc, be sited on the first floor flat roof to the rear of the property. Furthermore, if units cannot be located at the front of the building, EH request that a full acoustic survey be carried out with regard to any proposal to site

equipment on the ledge above the flat roof to the rear and a report provided to EH at the earliest opportunity. Having been in contact with Alex Kalebic, Head of Acquisitions for Loungers, we understand that he will be organising a survey to be done asap. We are happy to review our position once we receive further information from the applicant.

The decision must be in line with the licensing objectives contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

1. Executive summary

- 1.1 The purpose of the Licensing Sub-Committee meeting is to determine an application for a variation to the Premises Licence at **The Crabshell Inn, Embankment Road, Kingsbridge, TQ7 1JZ** in accordance with Section 35 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The Licensing Department have received two representations in objection to the application and therefore the application will need to be determined by the Licensing Sub-Committee.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Licensing Authority received an application from St Austell Brewery Company Ltd to vary their premises licence on 22 February 2024. The application is to:
 - Vary the premises licence plan to extend the licensable area to include the 'Shepherd Hut Servery' to be in use daily between the hours of 12:00 to 23:00.
 - To include additional conditions in Annex 2 of the premises licence to promote the licensing objectives.

A copy of the application form and proposed plan is attached at **Appendix A.**

- 2.2 The premises is currently licensed for the following:
 - Indoor sporting events:
 - Monday to Saturday from 11:00 to 00:00
 - Sunday from 12:00 to 23:00
 - Live music (indoors and outdoors):
 - Monday to Saturday from 11:00 to 00:00
 - Sunday from 12:00 to 23:00
 - Recorded music (indoors):
 - Monday to Saturday from 08:00 to 00:00
 - Sunday from 08:00 to 23:00
 - Performance of dance:
 - Monday to Saturday from 11:00 to 00:00
 - Sunday from 12:00 to 23:00
 - Supply of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises:
 - Monday to Saturday from 11:00 to 00:00
 - Sunday from 12:00 to 23:00
 - New Year's Eve from 11:00 to 03:00
 - Opening hours:
 - Monday to Sunday from 08:00 to 01:00
 - Sunday from 08:00 to 00:00
 - New Year's Eve from 08:00 to 04:00
- 2.3 A copy of the current premises licence and licence plan is at **Appendix B**.

- 2.4 The premises is a pub and restaurant located on the east bank of Kingsbridge estuary, about half a mile south of the town centre. It is in close proximity to other businesses and to residential properties. A plan showing the location of the premises is at **Appendix C**. The premises currently consists of a pub building with an outside seating area covered by a pergola. There are also benches sited along the waterfront, but these are not within the area covered by the premises licence. The proposed location of the 'Shepherd Hut Servery' is to the south of the covered seating area, which is currently part of the customer car park.
- 2.5 During the consultation period, two relevant representations were received in objection to the application from Kingsbridge Town Council and West Alvington Parish Council. Copies of the representations are attached at **Appendix D**.

Representations

- 2.6 Issues raised in the representations relate to the Public Safety and Prevention of Public Nuisance licensing objectives.
- 2.7 The main concerns relate to proximity of the new 'Shepherd Hut Servery' to the car park and the potential danger of cars manoeuvring close by to customers congregating outside the hut, particularly those with children.
- 2.8 In addition, there are concerns about the potential for increased noise disturbance and smells coming from the site and affecting neighbouring properties.
- 2.9 One of the representations makes reference to the recently refused planning application. Planning and Licensing are two separate regimes with their own legislation, so the refusal of the planning application does not mean that the premises licence application cannot be considered and subsequently granted, if the licensing sub-committee are so minded. The business would not be able to operate the 'Shepherd Hut Servery' as requested without first having both planning permission and premises licence approval in place.
- 2.10 Any information contained in the representations which is not relevant to the promotion of the four licensing objectives (see 2.14) cannot be taken into consideration when determining the premises licence application.

<u>Applicant Response to Representation</u>

2.11 Following receipt of the concerns raised by Kingsbridge Town Council, the Applicant has proposed positioning some planters outside the curtilage of the 'Shepherd Hut Servery' to obstruct vehicles from going into the area in front of the hut.

2.12 At the date of the completion of this report, we have not received further information regarding this proposition.

Policy and Statutory Guidance

- 2.13 Section 3.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.
- 2.14 The four licensing objectives are:
 - The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - The prevention of public nuisance
 - The protection of children from harm
- 2.15 Section 3.2 of the Policy states: These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be appropriate to achieve the licensing objectives. Each objective is of equal importance. A licence will only be granted where the Licensing Authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.
- 2.16 Section 2.4 of the Policy sets out additional legislation, strategies, policies and guidance to which the Licensing Authority will have regard.
- 2.17 The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 which was revised and re-published in August 2023 state: The Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives (paragraph 10.8 of the guidance).
- 2.18 The following responsible authorities are statutory consultees under the Licensing Act 2003:
 - Devon and Cornwall Police
 - Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service
 - Devon Safeguarding Children's Board
 - Devon County Council Trading Standards
 - Devon Drug and Alcohol Action Team, NHS Devon
 - South Hams District Council Planning Department
 - South Hams District Council Environmental Health (Health & Safety)
 - South Hams District Council Environmental Health (Pollution Control)
- 2.19 No representations have been received from responsible authorities.

2.20 In addition to the above responsible authorities, any person may make a representation in relation to a premises licence application.

3. Outcomes/outputs

- 3.1 When determining an application for a premises licence, particularly when considering appropriate conditions and operating hours, the following sections of the Statement of Licensing Policy (the policy) and Section 182 Guidance (the guidance) are especially relevant:
- 3.2 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave (paragraph 2.24 of the guidance).
- 3.3 Sections 5.5.1 and 5.5.2 of the policy states: The Licensing Authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application, but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are relevant objections to those hours raised on the basis of the licensing objectives.
- 3.4 However, when issuing a licence with hours beyond midnight it is more likely that relevant representations will be made unless there are higher standards of control within operating schedules in order to promote the licensing objectives, especially for premises which are situated near residential areas or in areas where anti-social disorder takes place.
- 3.5 Section 5.5.5 of the policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the Applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the Licensing Authority believe it appropriate to restrict the hours required due to the nature of the activities and the amenity of the area. If the Licensing Committee or a sub-committee believes that granting longer hours would undermine the licensing objectives, it may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested.
- 3.6 Section 3.8.1 of the Policy states: The Authority recognises the great variety of premises for which licences may be sought. These include theatres, members' clubs, sports clubs, cinemas, restaurants, pubs, nightclubs, cafes, takeaways, community halls, schools and off-licences. The Authority will not restrict access by

- children to any particular type of premises unless it is considered appropriate to do so in order to protect them from harm.
- 3.7 Section 3.8.6 of the Policy states: When deciding whether or not to limit access to children the Licensing Authority will judge each application on its own individual merits. Examples which may give rise to concern in respect of children would include premises: -
 - □ where entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is provided
 - where there is a strong element of gambling taking place
 - with a known association with drug taking or dealing
 - where there have been convictions of the current management for serving alcohol to those under 18 years
 - where the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is exclusive or primary purpose of the services provided at the premises
 - where there are unsupervised areas (for example toilets, beer gardens, play zones).
- 3.8 At paragraph 2.15 of the guidance it states: Licence holders should make provision to ensure that premises users safely leave their premises. Measures that may assist include:
 - Providing information on the premises of local taxi companies who can provide safe transportation home.
 - Ensuring adequate lighting outside the premises, particularly on paths leading to and from the premises and in car parks.
- 3.9 The desired outcome is a determination of the application with reasons provided which relate to the four licensing objectives and when conditions are imposed, that these are appropriate to address the licensing objectives.

4. Options available and consideration of risk

- 4.1 The Licensing Authority may decide to impose additional conditions to address the four licensing objectives, or to amend or remove requested licensable activities. When coming to their decision the Licensing Sub-Committee must give consideration to the Section 182 Guidance and the Statement of Licensing Policy. Reasons must be given which relate to the licensing objectives for any decision made.
- 4.2 The Sub-Committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential properties, the history of the management of the premises (if applicable), the evidence provided of any problems in the past, the likely impact of any extension of hours and activities, public transport, taxi availability, the right the applicant has to operate a business and balancing the rights of residents to the quiet enjoyment and privacy of family life. The

South Hams relies on tourism, with the population in the district doubling in the summer months with holidaymakers both from this country and international visitors who are, in the main, families with young children and retired people – the very segment of society who would perhaps be deterred by anti-social behaviour. These, and any other relevant issues, may be explored at the hearing in so far as it reflects the four licensing objectives.

- 4.3 A decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee may be appealed by the applicant or any person who has made relevant representations. The right of appeal is to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003. The Magistrates' Court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the Licensing Authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The Magistrates' Court may make any costs order it thinks fit.
- 4.4 The Licensing Act 2003 contains a provision which enables a responsible authority or any other person to apply to this Licensing Authority for a review of the premises licence once granted. A hearing follows which enables the Sub-Committee to use the normal powers available, but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to withdraw it.

5. Proposed Way Forward

- 5.1 That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a new Premises Licence and make a determination in respect of this application, namely to:
 - (i) modify the conditions of the licence;
 - ii) to reject the whole or part of the application;



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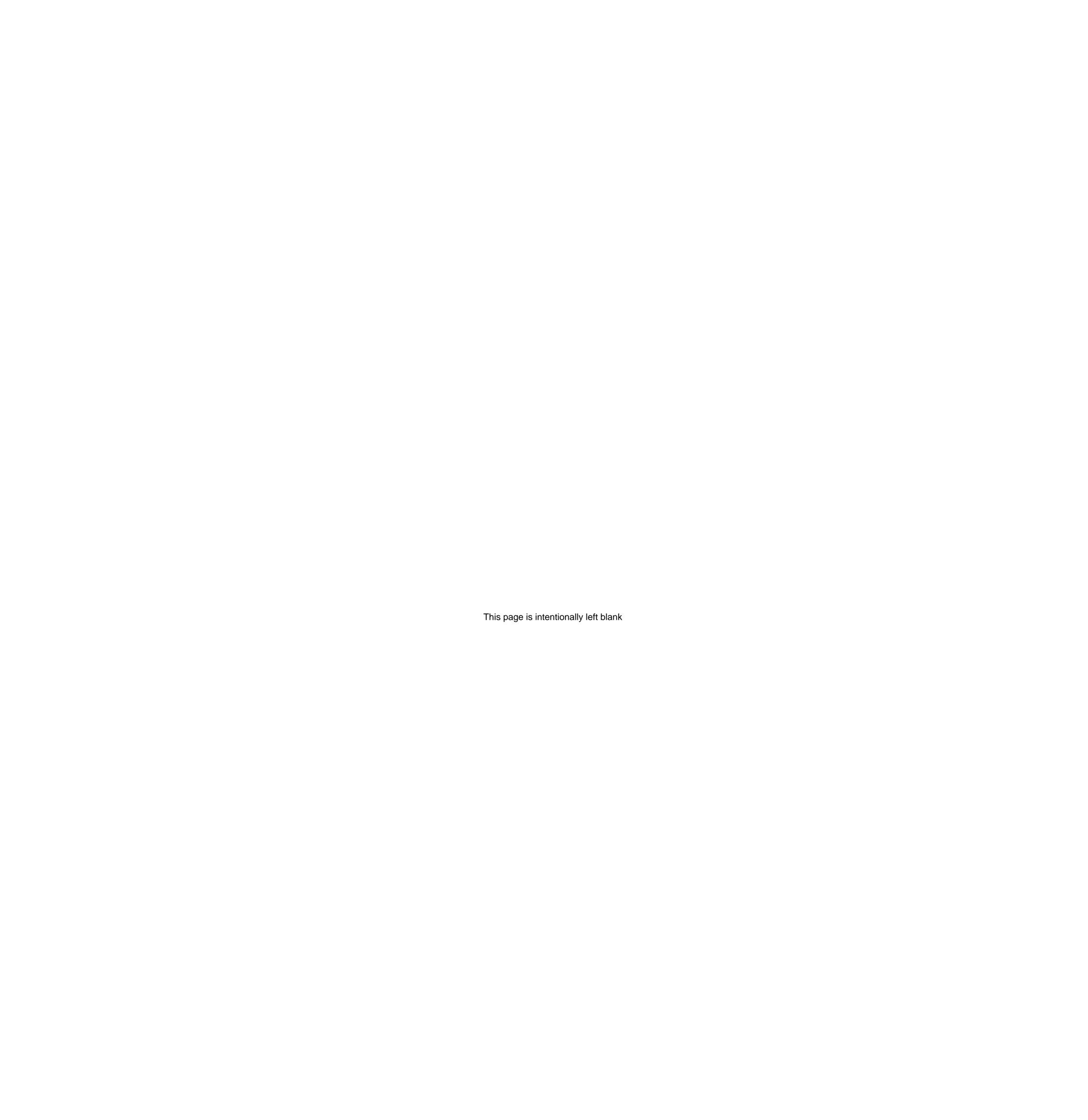

ANNEX 1 - Mandatory Licensing Conditions - Pubs, Clubs & Restaurants from 1st October 2014

Supply of alcohol

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:-

- 1. at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- 2. at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence has been suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Registered door staff

Each individual carrying out a 'security activity' must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority other than 1. in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or

- 2. in respect of premises in relation to any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
- 3. any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).

For the purposes of this section

- "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and
- paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

Minimum permitted price for the sale or supply of alcohol

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—
- (a) "dutv" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(a);
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula—
- $P = D + (D \times V)$

where—

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(b).
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be

a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

- 4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Irresponsible promotions

- (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

Potable water

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

Age verification

- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

Minimum measures

The responsible person must ensure that—

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the

customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Exhibition of films

The admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted to:

- 1. Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless `subsection (2)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.
- 2 Where
- a) The film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
- b) The relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.
- 3. In this section

"children" means persons aged under 18; and

"film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

ANNEX 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

GENERAL

- 1. All staff engaged in licensable activities at the premises must receive training and information in relation to the following:
- The Challenge 25 scheme in operation at the premises, including the forms of identification that are acceptable.
- The hours and activities permitted by the premises licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003 and conditions attached to the licence.
- How to complete and maintain the refusal register in operation at the premises (in relation to the sale of alcohol).
- Recognising the signs of drunkenness.
- The operating procedures for refusing service to any person who is drunk, under-age or appears to be under-age, or appears to be making a proxy purchase.
- Action to be taken in the event of an emergency, including reporting an incident to the emergency services.
- 2. Training must be recorded in documentary form and shall be regularly refreshed at no greater than 12 month intervals. Training records must be made available for inspection and copying at reasonable times upon request of an authorised officer of a responsible authority.
- Training records must be retained for at least 12 months.

PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

- 4. Staff must frequently supervise all areas of the premises including toilets, bar and dining areas, outside seating areas and car park.
- 5. Staff must be trained to not serve alcohol to anyone who appears to be under 18 years or to anyone who appears to be inebriated or troublesome.
- 6. A representative must attend the licensee association meetings for local information.
- 7. Customers must not be permitted to remove from the premises any drinks supplied by the premises (alcoholic or otherwise) in open containers
- 8. The collection of glasses and bottles must be undertaken at regular intervals to ensure there is no build-up of empties in and around the premises.
- 9. CCTV
- The premises must install, operate and maintain comprehensive digital colour CCTV.
- All public areas of the licensed premises including entry and exit points will be covered, including any

outside areas under the control of the premises licence holder.

- The system must record clear images permitting the identification of individuals, and in particular enable facial recognition images (a clear head and shoulder image) of every person entering and leaving in any light condition.
- The CCTV system must continually record whilst the premises are open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises.
- All equipment must have a constant and accurate time and date generation.
- All recordings must be stored for a minimum period of 28 days with date and time stamping.
- Viewable copies of recordings must be provided on request to the Police or local authority officers as soon as is reasonably practicable and in accordance with the Data Protection Act 2018 (or any replacement legislation)
- The CCTV system must be capable of downloading images to a recognisable viewable format.
- There must be security measures in place to ensure the integrity of the system to prevent the tampering with or deletion of images.
- 10. An alcohol sales refusal register must be kept at the premises and be maintained to include details of all alcohol sales refused. The register must include:
- the date and time of refusal
- the reason for refusal
- details of the person refusing the sale
- description of the customer
- any other relevant observations.
- 11. The refusals register must be made available for inspection and copying on request of an authorised officer of a responsible authority. All entries must be made within 24 hours of the refusal.
- 12. At any time when alcohol is offered for sale at the premises, the DPS must risk assess the need for Door Supervisors depending on the type and size of event planned. Should it be felt that there is a need for Door Supervisors there must be a minimum of 2 who must be Security Industry Authority (SIA) registered.
- 13. Depending on the type and size of event planned there must be a risk assessment carried as to the need for drinks to be served in plastic/paper/toughened glass or polycarbonate containers.

PUBLIC SAFETY

- Staff must clear empty glasses and bottles and sweep up any hazardous debris.
- 15. Rubbish must be properly binned.

PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

- 16. There must be no deliveries very early or very late.
- 17. A senior member of staff (manager) must keep control of noise levels inside and outside of the premises.
- 18. Staff must supervise the leaving of customers at all times, and especially in the later hours of the opening times.
- 19. The use of foul language or untoward behaviour must not be tolerated.
- 20. Noise or vibration must not emanate from the premises such as to cause persons in the neighbourhood to be unreasonably disturbed.
- 21. All external doors and windows must be kept shut, other than for access and egress, in all rooms when events involving amplified music or speech or other entertainment likely to give rise to noise are taking place.
- 22. Sufficient ventilation must be provided so that doors and windows can be kept closed.
- 23. Patrons must be asked not to stand around talking in the street outside the premises or any car park and

asked to leave the vicinity quickly and quietly.

- 24. Suitable signage at all relevant exits requesting that patrons make as little noise as possible when leaving the premises must be displayed.
- 25. Deliveries must not occur between the hours of 22:00 08:00 on any day of the week.
- 26. Glass bottles and other refuse must not be removed from the premises after 22:00 and not until 08:00 on any day of the week.

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

- 27. There must be in place a written age verification policy in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol, which must specify a Challenge 25 proof of age requirement. This means that staff working at the premises must ask individuals who appear to be under 25 years of age, attempting to purchase alcohol, to produce identification. The only acceptable identification documents will be:
- A photo driving licence
- A passport
- An identification card carrying the PASS hologram

Unless such identification is produced the sale of alcohol must be refused.

- 28. The age verification policy must include documented steps taken to prevent adults from purchasing alcohol for or on behalf of children under 18.
- 29. Under 16's must not be permitted in the bar and children must be accompanied by an adult. If children are seen to be alone staff must return them to their parents or guardians and request better supervision.






Example Image of Oak Framed Pergola



119.2 Amendment to Variation to Premises Licence

An application from St Austell Brewery Company Limited to amend the variation for the Premises Licence at The Crabshell Inn, Embankment Road, Kingsbridge, TQ7 1JZ.

The application is to:

Vary the layout and design of the premises to include the "Shepherd Hut Servery" as part of the permitted licensable area.

To add the following conditions to Annex 2:

The "Shepherd Hut Servery" shall be used between the hours of 12.00 until 23.00 Monday to Sunday. The external area will remain open for customers for consumption of food/drink until the premises closes to the public.

KTC: Recommend Refusal on the grounds that one of the licensing objectives "Public Safety" would not be met. The area in the vicinity of the Shepherd Hut is a car park. A Premises License would create greater footfall in the area and therefore be a hazard for families with children attempting to negotiate traffic flow.

Further to yours of 22nd February, the Councillors would make the following comments re the amendment to one of the conditions in the application from St Austell Brewery Company Limited to vary the premises licence for The Crabshell Inn, Embarkment Road, Kingsbridge, TQ7 1JZ:

- The planning application to regularise the shepherd hut servery has been refused, as such there should no longer be a need for this application to proceed.
- The proposed permitted licensable area is in the car park to the side of a public right of way. None of which are adequately separated from each other.
- This business is busy throughout the entire year, it is particularly popular with both residents and visitors. During peak season footfall to this site should not be underestimated.
- Actively encouraging a significant increase to the amount of external eating and drinking will
 increase the noise and smells coming from the site, this will impact on all surrounding
 businesses and neighboring properties, including those across the water.

To approve the extension of the sale of food/drink directly from the car park for a period of eleven hours per day does not meet with at least three of the four licensing conditions, those being public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm.

We request that no extension is granted.
