Tavistock Police confirm patrons of the establishment (when previously operating in this location by the applicant) did congregate in Bedford Square, did imped the dispersal of the Evening and Night-Time Economy (ENTE) and was linked to incidents of disorder/Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) requiring police intervention in the early hours (past 01:00 hrs).

I refer to the Witness Statements of Police Constable 10670 Luke (exhibit NH/2) and Police Constable 11313 Thompson (exhibit NH/3). The officers provide details with regards to policing the evening and night-time economy in Tavistock. Both officers provide specific details regarding the presence of the mobile catering vehicle and associated detrimental impact it has on the ENTE. The officers refer to matters such as, increased levels of anti-social behaviour including public order, public urination, criminal damage disorder whilst persons congregate around the mobile catering vehicle.

Exabit NH/2 - PC James; 'On most weekends, there would almost always be individuals fighting whilst all congregating around the burger van'.

PC James concludes his statement; 'I can say from my past experiences, that there was a direct link between the burger van not being present on certain weekends and reduced anti-social behaviour in the area'.

Exabit NH/3 - PC Thompson: 'there are many a night I have been patrolling around the town centre in particular around the burger van and Abbey Place when there has been public disorder such as people fighting, anti-social behaviour, urinating in the streets'...

'Even if there is no disorder there is usually a lot of people who do not (have) a volume control and it can be very noisy'...

PC Thompson concludes his statement; 'even if there is CCTV at the burger van as there has been in the past this does not seem to be much of a deterrent because people are drunk, and their inhibitions are lowered'.

The police are minded that this is not a review hearing but wish to provide details to the committee with regards to the nature of policing Bedford Square in relation to this mobile catering vehicle operating within the ENTE. To evidence the grounds for the police concerns in relation to the terminal hour as applied for.

Police Licensing record exhibit NH/4 - Police log 0075 of 18.05.19 - Report of violence - reported time 01:15 (approximately). The officer's report relates to disorder in Bedford Square highlighting factors that impede dispersal of the ENTE in Bedford Square: 'large number of people hanging around at the kebab van until after 02:30 hrs'.

Further concerns detailed by both officers relate to additional factors that impede dispersal in Tavistock namely the lack of taxi provision, the police fully recognise that this is not a factor for consideration by members in relation to the grant of this application, control of taxi provision undoubtedly sits outside of the remit of the hearing.

Exabit NH/5 – Police Log 85 of 14.07.18 - Time 01:15 - The report details two males engaged in a verbal altercation in Bedford Square, following escalation one male sustained injury. PC Thompson spoke to the operator of the mobile catering vehicle, having prior knowledge that CCTV was a requirement of the licence. PC Thompson was informed by the operator that the CCTV was non-operational and had not been for a couple of weeks.

Licence WDPLNA0052 (Toop's Food Bedford Square) operated by Mr Richard Edwards issued by WDBC Annex Two requires: The Prevention of Crime and Disorder: 1. CCTV will be maintained and working to the satisfaction of the Police and Local Authority. Failure to provide operational CCTV was a breach of the licence. It is an offence under s.136 of the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out licensable activities otherwise than in accordance with a premises licence. A person guilty of an offence under this section is liable on summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to a fine, or to both. Mr Edwards the applicant in this case was issued with a written warning and required to take immediate action to rectify the defect see exhibit NH/6.

Incidents continued:

Exhibit NH/7 - 24th August 2018 - The police were contact by the WDBC Licensing Specialist following receipt of complaints regarding the mobile catering vehicle relating to noise and litter. Police were advised that this matter was to be passed to the councils Environmental Health Team for a noise complaint procedure.

Exhibit NH/8 – 28th November 2017 – Officer report detailing disorder and ASB within the Tavistock ENTE. Time of report 01:30 hours - sighting the mobile catering vehicle as a location for ASB.

Exhibit NH/9 - 19th February 2017 - Officer report detailing disorder and ASB within the Tavistock ENTE. Time of report approximately 01.45 hours - sighting the hot food vehicle as a location for ASB.

In my 12 years as a Licensing Officer with the Devon and Cornwall Police I have felt the need to submit representations to West Devon Council on only one prior application for a Premises Licences, whereby agreement cannot be reached during the consultation period.

I respectfully request the committee give due consideration to the timings of the incidents outline above (NH/4, NH/5, NH/8, NH/9) all reported after 01:00 hours when determining the hours of operation to be granted. I draw the committee's attention to the police representation exhibit NH/1 page three regarding a reduced terminal operating hour. 	The Police Licensing Department have liaised with the area Police Inspector in respect of the application. Devon and Cornwall Police do not support the hours as detailed within the application or subsequent communication relating to a reduction in operating hours received on the 6 <sup>th</sup> October 2021.		
	Devon and Cornwall Police are aware the applicant has operated a catering unit of this nature in the location previously. It is the police view that a unit of this nature does attract intoxicated persons to the vicinity in the early hours and as a result, have a negative impact on the prevention for crime and disorder objective.		
	As detailed within <u>The Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 April 2018;</u> S3.21 The provision of late-night refreshment is regulated primarily because it is often linked to alcoholfuelled crime and disorder in the night-time economy, such as at fast-food takeaways where late-night drinkers congregate.		
	Patrons congregate in Bedford Square, impede the dispersal of the Evening and Night-Time Economy (ENTE), resulting in incidents of disorder/ASB requiring police intervention in the early hours.		
	The location of the premises is close to the town centre taxi rank however the number of taxis in the town at night to disperse customers is low, a concern the police have previously raised with the Council Licensing Department.		
	If the hours applied for are granted, this premises will operate as the latenight hot food premises in Tavistock and as previously evident (statements		

by police officers to be supplied as part of the police supporting evidence), attracts intoxicated persons to congregate in Bedford Square, predominantly on Friday and Saturday nights when venue(s) (pubs/bars) permitted for late night alcohol (on) sales operate later opening hours.

An earlier terminal hour (01:00 for example) for this premises would permit use by patrons of premises who operate until 00:30 hrs (\*of which majority in the vicinity do); assist in a reduction in persons congregating in the square in the early hours, support egress in the Evening and Night-Time Economy (ENTE) and reduce incidents of anti-social behaviour.

Tavistock's late-night 'on sale' (alcohol) venue is located on West Street approximately five minutes' walk away from Bedford Square, this premises is permitted to operate until:

\*Many alcohol 'on sale' venues within the town have a terminal hour of 00:30hrs on Friday and Saturdays, with some closing earlier mid-week - I refer to the permissions granted by WDBC.

SIA Security Staff deployment does support a reduction in anti-social behaviour (ASB), prevention of crime and disorder, aid quiet and orderly dispersal of patrons.

West Devon Borough Council Statement of Licensing Policy UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 2003 For the period January 2021 to January 2026:

3.5.11 The Authority recognises that door supervisors have an important function in terms of supervising customers not only inside premises but also outside. Door supervisors will therefore be expected to take a proactive role in managing the behaviour of customers within the immediate vicinity of the premises in order to minimise disturbance and nuisance to nearby residents. Licence holders should ensure in particular that, at closing times, they have sufficient door supervisors to effectively control 'surges' of customers leaving premises.

The deployment of SIA security staff within late night takeaway venues is a licensing requirement at some late-night premises solely licenced for the sale of hot food in towns and cities in Devon and Cornwall. This would be seen as a proportionate consideration for a venue operating for late night refreshment (LNR) in the earlier hours of the ENTE where the cliental base is made up of late-night drinkers.

SIA security staff deployment is a method utilised in the prevention of crime and disorder at premises who primarily serve intoxicated patrons' hot food within ENTE. However, the outside/street location of this premises and absence of a demarcated external area, to be operated under the control of the premises make additional measures such as the deployment of SIA security officers problematic. SIA supervisor deployment needs to be restricted to within the boundary of a premises and immediate vicinity of a premises, this would not be practical in this instance.

Example conditions for SIA supervisor deployment in premises licenced for LNR are:

- SIA registered door supervisors will be employed at the premises on [state days of week] from ##.## hours until premises close to the public.
- Door supervisors must be properly briefed and trained to manage queues in a safe and efficient manner.
- Door supervisors will be responsible for ensuring the safe, quiet and orderly dispersal of customers from the premises and the immediate vicinity of the premises.
- All door supervisors will be clearly identifiable and display their SIA badge in an approved method (i.e. arm display badge holder) at all times.
- The details for each door supervisor must be kept in a register.

The anti-social behaviour that I've witnessed has included public order, people urinating against buildings, vehicles or even in the middle of the street. I've witnessed criminal damage caused to buildings and vehicles. On most weekends, there would almost always be individuals fighting whilst all congregating around the burger van.

Such individuals have been dealt with through being arrested. This has the knock-on effect of removing a minimum of two Police officers from the area to transport the individual to the nearest custody centre. This is CHARLES CROSS CUSTODY in PLYMOUTH which is an hour round trip including the booking in process.

In the current climate where Police resources are thin on the ground. Also, in a rural setting where there is usually only a maximum of 4-5 officers across two Response sections covering night-time economy. Whilst also having to cover any potential logs that may come in.

There are residents who live in flats above retail premises in the town centre near to BEDFORD SQUARE. They would have to put up with the increased ASB in the area for a longer period.

There is also the welfare of the officers involved. I've had many shifts where I was due to finish at 03:00hrs extended into the early hours of the morning, meaning I've basically had to work a night shift. This has the knock-on effect of having to allow that officer to have a minimum of 11 hours between shifts. If that officer is having to start later due to finishing their previous shift late. This places additional strains upon the organisation.

I feel that allowing the applicant to have a license until 0600hrs would have a detrimental and increased demand upon Police locally. I can say from my past experiences, that there was a direct link between the burger van not being present on certain weekends and reduced anti-social behaviour in the area.

#### Good morning

We attended log 0075 18.05.2019 this evening following reports of a male kicking off and trying to fight multiple people in TAVISTOCK. The log came in at around 01:15hrs and we arrived at BEDFORD SQUARE at just after 01:30hrs and were in the area for over an hour. During this time we only saw 1 taxi, and once again a reasonably large number of people were hanging around at the kebab van until after 02:30hrs.

During that time there were small pockets of people who were clearly in drink that had no way of getting home and were just hanging around. Two small scuffles broke out. In my opinion the reluctance or lack of opportunity for people to get away from the town centre in the absence of taxis directly contributed to the issues.

I am concerned that there are not enough taxis operating on a Friday and Saturday night while the pubs and kebab van are still open. The general milling around provides opportunities for drunken violence and we have limited options for dispersing people from the town when no offences have been committed.

Could you have a look into taxi numbers on weekend nights in TAVISTOCK please, and also the operating hours of the kebab van? Or is this not something that has a minimum requirement level?
